Dear Parents/Carers and Children,

As we march on through to the Easter holidays The Bellbird has been a hive of activity. Not only have our children been engrossed in their learning, we have had enrichment activities galore! Read what each year group has been doing below to see the fun we have been having...

#### Reception

Wrens and Robins have been very busy chasing after runaway food this past fortnight! They read the book 'The Big Pancake' and learnt to retell the story with actions. Our littlest learners then had fun inventing their own runaway food. They had everything from runaway donuts being eaten by crocodiles to runaway pizzas being gobbled up by unicorns! They then designed and created different sorts of traps to stop their food escaping. The Reception classrooms were then a hive of activity preparing wonderful treats for Mother's Day. They drew daffodils, learnt

how to make peppermint creams and made bookmarks for their Mums. Most of all, they loved telling us why their Mums were so special! Well done Wrens and Robins.

## Year 1

Sparrows and Wagtails were thrilled to receive a reply from Matty Long, the author of last term's English text Super Happy Magic Forest. He was very impressed with the children's posters they sent him and wrote:

Thanks for getting in touch with all these fantastic creations! I loved looking through them and was amazed at the display. So much colour and creativity on show. Please tell your pupils I really enjoyed looking at them and had fun imagining new adventuring hero groups made up of their characters. They really captured the spirit of Super Happy Magic Forest.

In Science Year 1 continue their chemistry topic on Materials and have enjoyed lots of practical lessons investigating which material would be most suitable for making an umbrella and predicting and investigating which material would keep an ice cube frozen for longest.

# Year 2

Year 2 have started the construction of their Tudor houses. They have drawn a diagram of a Tudor houses, written about the features and are now starting their models. In English, they have been exploring poetry and have looked at different poems describing fire, including 'Fire' by Shirley Hughes. To prepare to write our own poems to describe fire for our book corners, we had our own fire in school! This helped us to collect lots of interesting adjectives.

#### Year 3

Year 3 have been enjoying performance poetry and have been learning about how to use rhythm

and rhyme effectively to write some raps of their own. They have also been to see some

real-life animals of the rainforest at Colchester Zoo for their Topic work. They loved seeing how they measured up against an orangutan's arm span and observing the sealions in the underwater tunnel. They are now having fun preparing for their assembly to parents next week!

#### Year 4

Year 4 had a wonderful time on their trip to the reconstructed Anglo-Saxon village at West Stow. They explored the museum and tried on Anglo-Saxon clothes, and got to handle lots of artefacts, including a cow's jawbone and a brooch! In the afternoon, they walked around the houses and learned about how archaeologists have experimented with working out how they were built. They finished our trip around the fire in the hall which gave us lots of inspiration for our retelling of the Anglo-Saxon legend Beowulf!

#### Year 5

Year 5 have been working with teachers and sixth form students from The Perse over the last few months, learning to sing and perform classical pieces of music. On Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> March, some of the children got to perform the pieces at West Road concert hall. It was an amazing afternoon, singing with other local primary schools, adults and sixth form students from The Perse, and all accompanied by a live orchestra. Well done year 5!

#### Year 6

Taking inspiration from the Spiderwick Chronicles Year 6 have worked

hard this week to create a class guide to the mystical fantastical creatures that are often hidden from human sight. The children have also explored animal adaptation and evolution in science through a practical experiment inspired by Darwin's finches. Using tweezers of varied size to represent bird beaks, they were challenged to feast upon wooden beads and rice to ascertain which bird would survive changes to their habitat.


# Assemblies this half term
