School Meals

We will be introducing a new way of pre ordering lunches from <u>Wednesday</u>, 5th February 2025. If your child would like a school lunch, you will need to ensure that you book this in advance.

To do this, please log into the School Gateway,

click on Pupils meals,

click on day you wish to choose,

choose from menu choices,

click on book selected days. You must remember to do this or it will not be saved.

Parents/carers will need to book at least <u>one day in advance</u> and children will no longer be able to choose their lunch in the morning. If your child has left their packed lunch at home, you will receive a phone call and be asked to bring it in. For children with special menus, please refer to your copy of your child's menu and order the equivalent colour preference on School Gateway.

The Importance of Reading with Your Child

Reading with your child at home is one of the most valuable activities you can do to support their learning. For our Reception (YR) children, daily reading is essential in reinforcing the sounds and graphemes they are learning at school. This practice helps build their confidence and supports their reading development.

As your child progresses through the school, the expectation is that they read at least three times a week. During these sessions, it's important to check for understanding and discuss the story. Your child's reading record book

contains some ideas on questions you can ask your child when they are reading to you. Asking thoughtful questions will deepen their comprehension and foster a love for reading. You can ask questions like:

- Can you tell me what has happened so far?
- What do you think will happen next?
- What type of character is...? Are they kind, rude, happy, miserable? How do we know this?
- How do you think the character feels at this point, and how do you know?
- Which is your favourite page and can you tell me why?
- Does this book/story remind you of any other books that you have read?

These discussions not only improve understanding but also help broaden your child's interests and vocabulary. We also ask that parents sign their child/ren's reading record book after each reading session. Please only add comments if you feel that it is helpful. There is no expectation that parents write comments every time they listen to their child read. Please remember, reading records will be checked at school on a weekly basis. In September 2024, the school introduced Fisher Family Trust reading fluency assessments for some of the children. These are used nationally to assess reading fluency. These have shown that many of our children who are priority readers are not reading at the rate that is appropriate for their age.

The National Expectation is that by the end of each year group, the children should be reading an age appropriate book at **approximately** the following rates:

EYFS	25 words per minute
Year 1	60 words per minute
Year 2	90 words per minute
Year 3	110 words per minute
Year 4	140 words per minute
Year 5	150 words per minute
Year 6	150 – 200 words per minute

Pace of reading of course is only one indicator of fluency. Both accuracy and prosody need to be measured too. By reading regularly with your child at home parents can greatly help with the development of all aspects of reading fluency. The more a child reads to an adult at home, the more likely they are to improve their fluency in reading.

Why School Attendance Matters: A Message for Parents

Attendance at school is vital for your child's academic success, wellbeing, and development. Regular attendance supports educational, social, and economic outcomes, while also fostering positive peer relationships that improve mental health.

Long-Term Benefits of Attendance Being present prepares children for adulthood and boosts future success. Students with high attendance consistently achieve better results. In 2019, 84% of Key Stage 2 pupils with 100% attendance met expected standards, compared to 40% of persistently absent pupils.

What is Persistent or Severe Absence?

- Persistently absent: Missing over 10% of school sessions.
- **Severely absent**: Missing over 50% of sessions.

Although absence rates have improved since the pandemic, reducing absences remains a priority to ensure every child benefits fully from school.

When to Keep Your Child Home Children with mild colds, like a minor cough or sore throat, can usually attend school. Keep your child home if they have a high temperature (38°C or above). Schools have guidance to help you decide, and additional illness advice is available on the NHS website.

Let's Work Together Whilst it is understandable that some children genuinely need to be off school, for many others, this is just not the case. Your support is crucial for improving attendance. Together, we can help every child reach their potential. If you need assistance, contact your child's school

Early Arrivers

I write with concerns about certain Y5 and Y6 pupils arriving up to 25 minutes before the school gates open. This early arrival has led to disruptive behaviour and use of the bike shelter on the KS1 path, leaving parents with pushchairs standing in the rain.
